CAN YOU RECYCLE IT?

OBJECTIVE: Collect recyclables to simultaneously help reprocess waste and fundraise for students.

Did you know that we throw away 25 million plastic bottles every hour? How about the fact that there is no limit to the number of times aluminum cans can be recycled? Both of these facts highlight the importance of recycling as a way to reduce our impact on the natural environment.

Many states have taken steps to encourage conscientious recycling practices by offering financial compensation for recyclables such as bottles and cans. If you live in any of the states listed on the right, research their recycling programs to discover the next steps you'll need to follow to complete this event.

By collecting recyclable cans and bottles to exchange for money through these programs, you will both represent the value of environmental consciousness and help fundraise for the Student Corps scholarship. At the end of the year, the National Board of the Student Corps will choose a worthy student from the Big Brothers Big Sisters program to sponsor, and donate money collected through this event and others to help support that student.

Do you know where all the local parks are in your neighborhood? Maybe you don't know a thing about local horticulture and conservation councils. In this event, you will explore your town's conservation grounds, and choose a park to help maintain and learn about throughout a year.

To find your local sanctuaries, try contacting your town's conservation council! Often, these councils will be able to direct you to locations near you in search of help and service.

After that, there are many paths you and your chapter can take to protect these sanctuaries, including:

Year-long Clean Ups

 Maintaining a sanctuary is hard work! Many sanctuary guardians need help clearing paths or removing debris after storms. Consider offering your chapter's time to help restore sanctuaries for visitors

Spread Awareness

If you didn't know about your local sanctuary before asking about it, chances are, others won't have either. Try making an event that brings the local community together in your park, so that you can show people their local wonders!

Educate Visitors

 The diversity of life in local sanctuaries is amazing.
 Dedicate time to learning and teaching about your sanctuary by making brochures or web pages explaining the different fauna and flora living in your local park!

One area of town always looking for help from students is the hospital. For those interested in entering biomedical fields, a chance to gain insight on the inner workings of a hospital can be invaluable experience as well. Here are a few ways you can lead your chapter to help hospitals:

Change the atmosphere

There are many ways to brighten up a hospital room! For instance, create an event in which students gather to <u>paint</u> <u>colorful pictures</u>, or practice a medley of songs to perform for patients.

Fundraise for facilities

Hospitals are always appreciative of extra funding to help support indispensible services. Raise money through a school bake sale, or host a raffle to fundraise for your local hospital throughout the year.

Provide clerical support

Even if you are not interested in entering biomedical fields, you can always offer your help at hospital gift shops or registration desks. Without much training, you can be a helpful member of the hospital staff!

Assist patient services

Though this requires some heavier training, helping hospitals with patient services can be a great way to contribute your time, as well as learn about what it is like to be a doctor or nurse.

Volunteering at the hospital will offer experience that transcends the classroom walls!

Step 1: Find your nearest food pantry by using this site.

Step 2: Gather a group of students willing to host a drive.

Step 3: Contact your local supermarket manager to ask for permission to run a food drive outside of their store.

Step 4: Host your food drive! Look at your local food pantry's website to see their guidelines on what types of foods they accept. Accept food and money donations.

Step 5: Drop off your donations at your local food pantry!

OBJECTIVE: Collect leftover Halloween candy to distribute to various non-profit organizations.

Thanks to Operation Gratitude, you can give your leftover candy to deployed troops and first responders overseas, the protectors of the American people. Here are some ideas for candy drives:

- Set up a candy drive at your school. Consider separating classrooms into teams, and compete to see who can come up with the heaviest bag of treats to donate!
- Go around the neighborhood after Halloween and explain your event, to see if anyone is willing to offer up their candy. Many adults have extra candy they weren't able to hand out during Halloween to add to your pile.

OBJECTIVE: Dedicate service to your local library to improve their services or host community events.

In 1731, our founding father Benjamin Franklin drafted a plan for the first ever library in the United States, because according to him, "Being ignorant is not so much a shame, as being unwilling to learn." Today, libraries are a great example of the community coming together to serve itself and provide resources to the public. Nevertheless, libraries are often in need of help from students.

Here are some ways to contribute your chapter's service to your local libraries:

Maintain the Library

 Libraries are always looking for helpers for custodial work, managing circulation, and facilitating programs. Contact your local library to find its needs.

Host a Book Drive

 Books are at the heart of a successful library. Host a book drive, or collect cheap books from garage sales to donate to your local or school library.

Set up an Art Gallery

Teach a Class

SHORT TERM EVENT



OBJECTIVE: Celebrate Arbor Day by hosting a tree-planting event in your community.

AGE: Anyone!

OUR VALUES: Commitment to community, preservation of the environment, instilling responsibility, spreading awareness for a local issue.

In the past years, deforestation, climate change, forest fires, and the introduction of invasive species have killed many trees in American forests. For this Arbor Day, host an event for planting trees to celebrate the importance of trees.

Planting trees preserves water quality in our local reservoirs, restores habitats for wildlife, reduces our carbon footprint, and helps recovery from invasive species' attacks.

Talk to your local conservation council to begin organizing a town-wide effort to plant trees. A good place to start is in school lawns, roadside gardens, and on front lawns.

If your chapter is unable to negotiate such a program, also consider fundraising for programs such as <u>Plant a Billion Trees</u> or the <u>National Forest Foundation</u>.

Up to 28,000 species can go extinct in the next quarter century due to deforestation.

Tropical deforestation is the 2nd biggest contributor to climate change.

One tree can absorb as much carbon in a year as a car produces while driving 26,000 miles.



GENERATIONAL GET-TOGETHER

OBJECTIVE: Visit senior homes to bring smiles to residents' faces and listen to their stories.

AGE: Anyone

OUR VALUES: Commitment to community, compassion for others, broadening our perspectives, establishing relationships.

As youth, one of the best things students can do is bring their energy and spirit to local senior homes. Moreover, the elderly often have indispensable wisdom to share with young students. Thus, bringing together students and seniors is a great way to tighten the bonds within a community and build lifelong relationships.

There are many ways to devote your time and energy into a senior home:

- 1. **Be a companion:** Bring your chapter to senior homes weekly to listen to their stories over some tea and music. Share your stories with them, and listen to their own stories -- they have many!
- Help with dining services: Come during a mealtime to help prepare and serve food to seniors!
- 3. **Brighten up their room:** After establishing a close relationship with senior residents, offer to brighten up their room by bringing fresh flowers, photographs, and colorful art. This is a wonderful way to liven up the atmosphere of a senior home.
- 4. Offer to help conduct activities: Many senior homes have activity programs, such as game nights or art projects for seniors. Give your time to help run these programs!
- 5. **Prepare musical or dance performances:** Do members of your chapter have musical or performing talents? Prepare a short performance to bring music into a senior home and showcase your talents.
